SAFETY - The Firefighters urge everyone within the District to help them keep the wreaths that are displayed at the fire stations for the holidays...RED. If there is a fire within the district that is started by holiday decorations, a red bulb is exchanged with a white one. Over the past 5 years we have had only one red bulb replaced. Compliments to you on this enviable record.

Before using your fireplace be sure that the necessary repairs have been done, that the flue is open and that a screen covers the opening.

Use only lights that have been tested for safety and carry the UL label from Underwriters Laboratories. Always turn off your lights when retiring or when you leave home.

Do not burn your holiday wrappings in the fireplace.

Check your smoke detectors.

They do save lives!!

TREES - Artificial trees should bare an inspection/approval label. A fresh tree will stay greener longer and be less of a fire hazard if it stays watered. Place your tree in a safe location, away from radiators, fireplaces and other heat sources.

FINALLY - Use 9-1-1 to call for fire, police and ambulance. If you have a problem with using 9-1-1, please let us know so we can pass on the problem to the county for correction. Have a happy and safe holiday season.

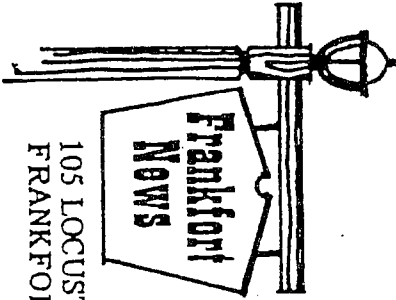
VALLEY VIEW CARD PARTY
