SILVER CROSS HOSPITAL

When Silver Cross Hospital first opened its doors on Thanksgiving Day, 1895, the dream of the Will County Union of King's Daughters and Sons had been realized. This Christian charitable group, whose original members nursed the Crusaders in the Middle Ages, was organized in 1890 and spent five years planning and raising funds to make a dream come true. In 1895, the community was presented with a 33 bed, two-story hospital named for the King's Daughters' emblem...the silver Maltese cross. That same year, the Silver Cross School of Nursing opened to begin training young women to care for the sick.

Today complete medical care is available both at Silver Cross Hospital and at all of the seven affiliated health care centers located throughout Will and Southwest Cook County.

The Commission has the responsibility of evaluating existing programs and services for children of all ages and families and identifying areas needing attention to maintain the best possible environment for young people.

Realizing that it takes everyone working together to assure the well-being of our children, the Youth Commission promotes ongoing communication and cooperation among the organizations and institutions within the village. The adult members of the commission are Gladys Boyer (Frankfort Public Library), Dr. JoAnn Desmond (Frankfort School District), James Grady (Frankfort Fire Department), Kris Hanna (Frankfort Park District, Rev. David Pattee (Frankfort Ministerial Association), Rosalie Plechaty (Frankfort P.T.A.), Tom Ricker (Village of Frankfort), Jan Rizzuto (Civic Organization), Sandy Robertson (Project BEGIN), Ron Smith (Frankfort Police Department), Chuck Wanner (InTouch Program) and Dr. Lawrence Wyllie, (Lincoln-Way High School).

A Teen Committee provides valuable input from the youth perspective. Members of the Teen Committee are Jessica Edwards, Mike Rizzuto, Tim Schehl, John Davis, Sarah Kostok, Ashlee Harris, Eric Hudson, Amy Lamar, Lisa Ropke, and Andre Sutka.

Thanks to the work of the adult and teen members, the following projects are underway: Conducting a community resource and needs assessment. (A survey of all 6th, 7th and 8th grade students at Frankfort Junior High School has been completed.)

Creating complete directory of family and youth services, and finding new ways to maximize participating in existing programs.

Exploring the idea of a TV program for teens produced by teens in cooperation with Channel 10.

Studying ordinances to place stronger limits on the availability and use of tobacco products by people under the age of 18.

The regular meetings of the Frankfort Youth Commission are held on the first Thursday of each month at 3:30 PM. Residents of Frankfort are encouraged to attend the annual meeting of the Youth Commission in February in the Old Grade School to meet the members of the Commission and give input on needs in the community. This meeting will also provide an opportunity for residents to learn about plans to expand and enhance Park District services and programs.

Library books that were being tossed out were picked up from the libraries of Dolton, Thornton, Homewood, Joliet, Mokena, Orland, Palos and the Bargain Box in Homewood. Donations gathered from the public were brought to the Old Junior High in Frankfort by book sale volunteers.

This was a total recycling effort, publicity was printed on ONE-SIDE-Good paper; envelope misprints were used to send out publicity; posters were gotten from the scrap heap; used coloring books and work books which normally would be tossed out were sent home free with book sale customers...and resulted in a record gross profit of \$4200; and remember, this whole profit is made from items slated to be discarded!

And what about the left overs after the sale? Were they discarded? Paperbacks were given to Sid Cooke who takes them to nursing homes and VA Hospitals, and the hard covers were sent to Joliet prison.

Of course, none of this would have happened without the help of our wonderful volunteers. We especially want to thank the kids from St. Anthony's CCD classes and the kids from Lincoln-Way's civics classes, all of which were working off community service hours. They not only set up the sale faster than ever before, on clean up day, they did that faster than previous records! And they were fun too! "CHILDREN OF VETERANS SCHOLARSHIP"

Frank M. Desiderio, Will County Regional Superintendent of Schools, is pleased to announce that his office has information and applications regarding the "Children of Veterans Scholarship" program. The program offers four-year tuition scholarships at the University of Illinois (Chicago and Champaign-Urbana campuses) in the areas of undergraduate, graduate and professional studies. It is open to any child of Veterans of World War Two, the Korean Conflict or the Vietnam Conflict. Eligibility requirements include: enrollment or admittance to the U. Of I by April 15, 1995, be a natural or legally adopted child of a veteran, parental proof of service, ACT scores on file at the U. of I. by March 1, 1995, (no SAT scores permitted), and the child cannot have previously used a "Children of Veterans Scholarship".

Selection criteria will be included in packets of information sent to the applicants. Applications will be accepted between January 1, 1995 and March 13, 1995.

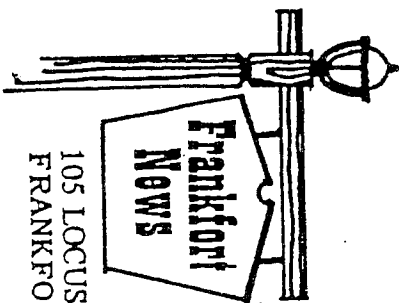
