CORRECTION

Further investigation by Frankfort Park District officials of tax rates for the upcoming April 4 referendum established that some figures were released in error. The Park District Board apologizes for any inconvenience.

The Park District referendum will not ask for a tax increase; it will ask to refinance existing bonds for a term of 17-20 years. The amount that will remain on Frankfort residents' tax bill is approximately \$40 per year on a home valued at \$150,000. Residents are already paying this amount. Extending these bonds will allow the Park District to refurbish the Old Junior High into a Community Center for all ages as well as purchase land and construct a new 30-acre outdoor sports complex with baseball and soccer fields. As Frankfort continues to grow, additional expansion is needed in the areas of facilities, fields and programs. The passage of this referendum would help accomplish this expansion without raising taxes. A volunteer committee, "Citizens' for Frankfort Parks" has been formed to work for the referendum. The committee asks that you join with them to envision the Frankfort that our children and grandchildren will enjoy; one that continues to preserve its heritage while moving

As you might know, we were able to raise over \$30,000. The Water Tower/Life Membership Campaign was very successful (John Herder's idea).

SAFETY FIRST

Trying to make its programs the safest for individuals with disabilities who are residents of New Lenox, Frankfort, Mokena and Peotone Park Districts has been a constant goal of Lincoln-Way Special Recreation Association. Apparently, their efforts are beginning to pay off.

Since June 1, 1992, the Association has been a member of the Park District Risk Management Agency which is a self-insurance risk pool made up of 114 Illinois Park and Recreation Agencies. The risk pool annually evaluates its members' loss control programs. This evaluation rated Lincoln-Way Special Recreation Association "Excellent Level A."

The Association was awarded a final point rating of 98% when only

three years before the Association was rated only 83%.

In addition, the Association was recognized as being "excellent" for two years in a row, thereby, being awarded the supreme status of "Accredited," which means they will not be evaluated for a three year period.

Jan Bendy, Safety Coordinator and Director for the Lincoln-Way Special Recreation Association, was very appreciative of the award and the hard work by staff and the safety committee.

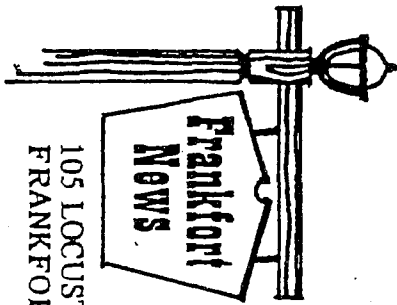
