The Village of Frankfort will begin its annual Spring Hydrant Flushing on April 24, 1995.

Residents are advised to use as little water as possible during the period their area is being flushed. While the water will be safe to drink, a noticeable rusty cast will appear in the water.

On April 4 ballot, voters will be asked to approve a referendum for the Frankfort Park District. The referendum is a \$2.5 million bond issue, using \$1.3 million to renovate the Old Junior High School into a community center for all ages and \$1.2 million to purchase a new parcel of land and complete a 30-acre sports complex. The referendum will not be a tax increase, rather it is a refinancing of existing bonds to extend, for an additional 17-20 years, a tax that you are already paying. We ask that voters consider the referendum issue and join together to support it. Without raising your taxes, two new projects that will greatly benefit the residents of Frankfort can be completed. The Old Junior High, a building rich in heritage and memories, can be given a new life. 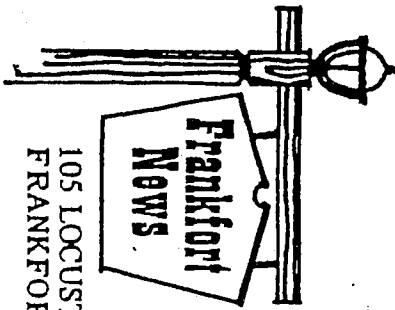
