POLICE DEPARTMENT BULLETIN

It is again time to remind everyone of a major event about to occur in our community. The annual Fall Festival is upon us and we need the cooperation of all our citizens to ensure a successful festival. As usual, there will be major inconveniences. In an effort to reduce these inconveniences we provide the following information.

ROADBLOCKS are intended to minimize the number of cars that enter the downtown area and to ensure that emergency vehicles are able to move about the community. Individuals with friends or family should be instructed on how to enter town via the back roads. Saturday and Sunday from 9 AM to 10 PM and Monday from 9 AM to 4 PM:

- 1) No Southbound traffic on White St.
- 2) Only vehicles displaying a 1995 Village sticker will be allowed eastbound on Nebraska Street from Rt.45.
- 3) No southbound traffic on Elsner Road or eastbound on Nebraska Street from Elsner except for local traffic.

PARKING RESTRICTIONS allow NO parking Saturday through Monday

at the following locations:

Carpenter Street, Elwood Street,
Smith Street, East and West Bowen
Streets, White Street, Center Road
from Pfaff - E.J.&E. Railroad,

ter Road, Route 45 - Route 30 to
Nebraska, West side of Ash - Ne-
braska to Oregon, North side of
Oregon - Ash to Oak, and East
side of Oak - Nebraska to Oregon.

ADDITIONAL NO PARKING AREAS
WILL BE POSTED ALONG PARADE ROUTE
ON SUNDAY.

At 10 PM curfew will be imposed in the downtown area for ALL Persons under the age of 21 from Thursday, August 31 through Monday, September 4, 1995.

Pitch in during the second Paws to Recycle to help orphaned animals and the environment. During September and October, you can drop off recyclable aluminum food and beverage containers at participating nonprofit and municipal animal shelters. Proceeds from the salvaged metal go to the shelter. During last year's pilot program, almost \$250,000 was raised from 14.5 million cans.

Among those who might make a huge dent in the need, are community groups and clubs, school classes or kids scouring the neighborhood for soda pop cans. College dorms are a likely source for empty cans too.

Contact your area's animal shelter to make certain they are taking part. The five shelters that raise the most money will receive an additional \$3,000 in grand prizes from the project's sponsors, the American Humane Association, Friskies PetCare Company and Aluminum Company of America (Alcoa).

FULBRIGHT EXCHANGE PROGRAMS

The Will County Regional Office of Education has received information on the 1996-1997 Fulbright Teacher Exchange Programs. The Fulbright program provides opportunity for qualified educators and administrators to either participate in a direct exchange of positions with

teachers/administrators from other countries during the 1996-1997 academic year or attend a seminar abroad in Italy (teachers of Latin, Greek or the Classics). Eligible to participate are teachers and administrators from the elementary through the post secondary levels who meet the following requirements, 1) U.S. citizenship; 2) Fluency in English; 3) Bachelor's degree or higher; 4) Three years of full-time teaching experience; and 5) A current full-time teaching or administrative position. THE SUMMER READING PROGRAM, "Reading Is Tremendous," was concluded on August 5 with 565 children enrolled. Of that number, 237 read the required number of books to reach the goal for their age group and had their names posted on the wall in the Youth Services Department. Many received prizes (canvas bookbags, twig pens, Pisces Parlor coupons, Creamery gift certificates and paperback books) in the drawing that was held at the end of the reading program.

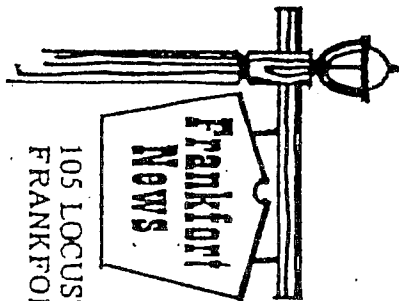
