ADOPT-A-CORNER VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

Several Frankfort residents have been assisting the Village of Frankfort maintain street corner flower beds in the downtown area and along Route 30. The Frankfort Historical Society does the beds in the Heritage Hall Parking lot. Cathy Gregor and Vivienne Ellis of the Frankfort Area Garden Club assist Bruce Stone of the village by making phone calls to the volunteers.

The two beds on the north side of Route 30 and Elm need adopting next year. There are currently no flower beds in the corner plantings, but Bruce Stone is willing to install flower beds if suitable plans are submitted.

FRANKFORT FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT
PREVENTION INSPECTION BUREAU

The Frankfort, Mokena and New Lenox Fire Districts have combined their Fire Prevention sources and made a joint purchase of a "Kids Fire Safety House."

The "Kids Safety House" is built on a travel trailer frame, the interior is configured like a miniature house with rooms of the house where fire is most likely to occur: kitchen, living room and bedroom. The kitchen has a stove, microwave and sink. The stove and microwave will demonstrate hazards such as pots on the stove, towels hanging near the stove or microwave, also hot items that are removed from the stove or microwave, as well as electrical appliances placed near the sink. The living room has a fireplace where placing paper near it could be a potential hazard. The bedroom on the second floor could be used for demonstrating exiting the house if a fire would ever occur.

All of this is operated in a small room inside the trailer. In this room are the controls for the theatrical smoke machine, the heated door panel, closed circuit television that monitors the operation and the telephone for the 9-1-1 system. The house also includes other life-saving devices such as smoke detectors, fire extinguishers and escape ladder from the second story balcony which children can practice escape techniques. After they exit the house, the internal "9-1-1" system can be used to report emergencies.

The trailer made its debut in the Frankfort Fall Festival Parade on September 3, 1995 and will be sched-

uled to visit the schools in Frankfort, Frankfort Square, Arbury Hills and Green Garden. The "Kids Fire Safety House" will also be at the Public Safety Expo, October 15, 11 AM to 3 PM at the Frankfort Main Park. The Expo is sponsored by the Frankfort Fire and Police Department.

FAX POLICY CHANGED: The Frankfort Public Library Board accepted a new Fax policy at its September 14, 1995 meeting. There will no longer be a need for a cover letter sent with the faxed document because the library will be using a Post-It Fax form that will be attached to the document. The fee will still be \$1 per page faxed.

SCHOOL DISTRICT 157C NEWS

At the September 11 Board of Education meeting, the Board adopted the 1995-96 budget. The budget projects a total revenue of all funds of \$8,109,316 and an overall expenditure amount that shows the district will be operating in the black. This represents the best cash flow position since 1986. The transportation fund shows some strain due to the continual increase in students coming into the district, necessitating more transportation routes and some changes in the routing.

According to Superintendent Dr. Pamela L. Witt, the current school enrollment is 1,340 students; 551 at Chelsea, 455 at Hickory Creek, 313 at Frankfort Junior High and 21 in Special Education. This includes 103 new students. An additional kindergarten class will be created on or about October 2 to address the kindergarten enrollment of 128, a significant increase compared to last year.

The Hickory Creek School renovation is completed and a dedication ceremony was held September 14. Grand Prairie Elementary is progressing on schedule and the administrators are pleased with the contractor's work to date.

District Library Coordinator, Dotty Zales, is interested in creating a historical archive focusing on the history of 157C. Plaques, photos, historical documents, letters or books would all be welcomed additions to this effort. To date, the archive has a collection of fiction and non-fiction books which are more than 50 years old. The books were dis-

covered by Mrs. Zales and her aides while weeding out library shelves last year. Anyone with historical items related to the school district is invited to participate in creation of the archive. If you would like to donate an item, please call Mrs. Zales at Hickory Creek School, 469-4450. Your little piece of history can have a lasting place of honor to be enjoyed by the students of tomorrow!

In a JCA volleyball tournament the weekend of September 9, the Frankfort Junior High Girl's Volleyball team, coached by Ryan McWilliams, took first place 5-0 and received a trophy.

Frankfort Junior High celebrated its Blue Ribbon School for Excellence status with a special ceremony September 19 when they buried a time capsule. The event was sponsored by Student Council Representatives, under the direction of Terry Lewis. Among the items chosen by the students to be placed in the time capsule: a 1994 yearbook, a Blue Ribbon award, a video depicting events of the last year, a memorial card honoring former student Ryan Kieffer, a 1994 issue of TV Guide, and a listing of grocery and gasoline prices. After the Pledge to the Flag, musical selections by the band and the burying of the time capsule, an all-school picnic was held outside at lunch time.

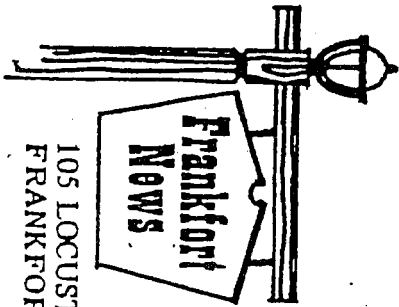
