#### FRANKFORT GRADE SCHOOLS PROJECT B.E.G.I.N.

Our pre-kindergarten and parenting program for at-risk preschoolers and their families is celebrating its fifth year of operation. Project B.E.G.I.N., Better Educational Growth Invested Now, services approximately 108 children and their families. The program is funded through a grant awarded to Lincoln-Way area schools by the Illinois State Board

State Board of Education and the Drug Free Schools and the Communities program. All five of the school districts that send students to Lincoln-Way High School participate in the program, with School District 157-C serving as the administrative district. The school's coordinator is Sandy Robertson and the school operates in the Sports Complex on Laraway Road. We are proud to be considered a prototype for this type of program and a model school in Illinois.

Because the program is funded primarily through grants, the school welcomes tax-deductible donations of cash or supplies. Special thanks to the Frankfort Lions Club for their generous cash donation as well as their adoption of the school's libraries as long-term projects. Thanks too, to the Frankfort, Mokena, and New Lenox Kiwanis Club members who contributed by applying for the "Reading is Fundamental" national grant to buy books for the school and their commitment to read twice a month to the children. ### SILVER CROSS HOSPITAL NEWS BENEFIT PICNIC

More than \$15,000 was raised for Will County's abused children at the Benefit Picnic on September 16. The event, sponsored by Silver Cross Hospital, Indocom/Van Mack Electric and **American Eagle Construction** was held at the Round Barn Farm in Manhattan. More than 1,500 people were in attendance.

Guests were provided with food and entertainment throughout the day. Music by the Whiskey Bent Band, Bluz Boyzz, and T-Bird Huck echoed across the grounds at the farm. In addition there were face painters, clowns, hayrides, a petting zoo, children's games, volleyball, horseshoes, bingo and child fingerpainting. Pat Handorf of Wilmington took home \$675 after winning the 50/50 raffle.

The fundraiser was supported by several vendors who donated food and supplies, the Round Barn Farm,

and volunteer workers from the Joliet Chapter 1025 Harley Owners Group, Illinois State Police Division of Forensic Services and Identification, Manhattan Fire Department, Silver Cross Hospital, Indicom/Van Mack Electric and American Eagle Construction.

"I was overwhelmed by the support for the Children's Advocacy Center that was demonstrated by the personnel of Silver Cross Hospital, the members of organized labor, and the public in general at the fundraiser picnic," said Will County State's Attorney James Glasgow.

"Establishing a steady source of funding for the Center is a priority and the money raised at this benefit could not have come at a better time. There is no way that words can properly convey my gratitude to everyone involved. Everyone involved with this effort should take pride in knowing that they've helped make law enforcement much more effective in the battle against child sexual abuse," Glasgow added.

The purpose of the Children's Advocacy Center is to provide emotional, intellectual, and physical care for victims of child abuse. This is the first step in an effort toward prevention, intervention, and educational programs aimed at heightening social awareness. The Center is located in the Rabbi Morris Hershman Medical Arts Building on the campus of Silver Cross Hospital.

### SILVER CROSS HOSPITAL WILL COUNTY UNITED WAY

The Silver Cross Hospital raised over \$40,000 for the Will County United Way, through a combination of employee donations and several

fundraising activities held in October. A check for \$42,500 was presented to United Way by the Hospital.

Profits to our school district were over \$2300 and it's already being used to purchase books for all three school libraries. Many thanks to everyone involved for a job well done.

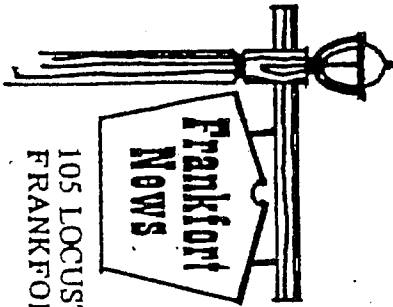
