25th JUBILEE YEAR

Continues from February's edition. History of St. Anthony's Parish.

The very small Catholic parish grew over thirty years, until in 1972, the small congregation of 150 families petitioned Bishop Romeo Blanchette on two different occasions asking that St. Anthony's become a parish in its own right, rather than being a part of St. Mary's. Bishop Blanchette said yes. Their first, non-boxcar home was a small building on Rt. 30 and 79th Avenue, which they soon outgrew. This building housed a preschool for a few years and later was used as a parish center.

Through the efforts of the parishioners and their Protestant friends, the fledgling parish was soon able to build a multi-purpose building on Sauk Trail in 1976. The parish continued to grow and in 1983 they built a church attached to the original multi-purpose building by an atrium.

The parish continues to grow and at this time is planning to build a parish center to accommodate all the varied ministries that happen at the Church. History does repeat itself!

The parish has had three pastors, Father James Frederick, Father Arno Dennerlein, and the present pastor, Father Vytas Memenas.

Since 1972, the parish has grown from 150 families to over 2500 families, and continues to steadily grow even larger.

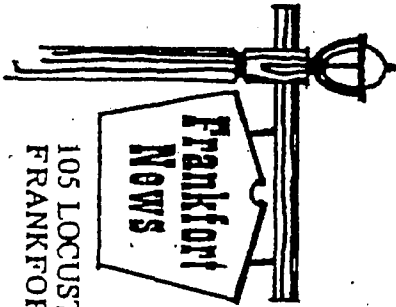
