HISTORICAL FACTS

We came across the following article as we were preparing this final edition of the Frankfort News. It was written by Eris Rudman. Being involved in community came easily to her. Baseball units out there, this is a part of your history. Continue your participation in all that Frankfort has to offer.

"LOOK WHAT I FOUND IN AN OLD BOX"

A meeting was held at the Rudman's at 7 PM on Thursday the 11th of October (no year given). The purpose was to organize a Babe Ruth Team.

Gerry Francis reported it would cost between \$400 and \$500 to get the team started. This would include uniforms, equipment, insurance and entrance fee.

It was agreed the men present would ask the business men of Frankfort to donate \$8 for the purpose of starting a Babe Ruth team. On the uniforms would read "Frankfort Merchants."

Other ways & means for Babe Ruth boys to raise money was discussed: Car stickers, car washing, snow shoveling and movies. Also discussed was each boy paying an entrance fee of \$3 or \$5. This is common practice in many leagues reported Gerry Francis.

It was agreed a bank account would be opened in the name of Frankfort Babe Ruth. Eris Rudman was appointed treasurer.

Those attending the meeting were: Paul Lambrecht and Tommy, Gerry Francis and Wayne, Eugene Batson and Russell, Russell Davis and Randy, Frank Fleck and Frank, Jr., John Schilling and Artie, Marion Kohlbacker, Bob Blackwell, Keith Schram and Eris Rudman reporting.

That was the beginning of Babe Ruth League. How many do we have now?

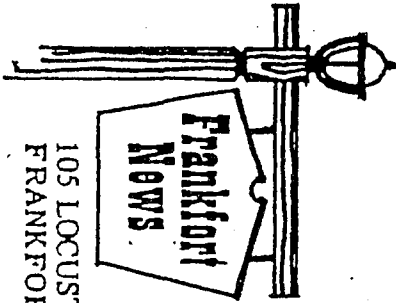
